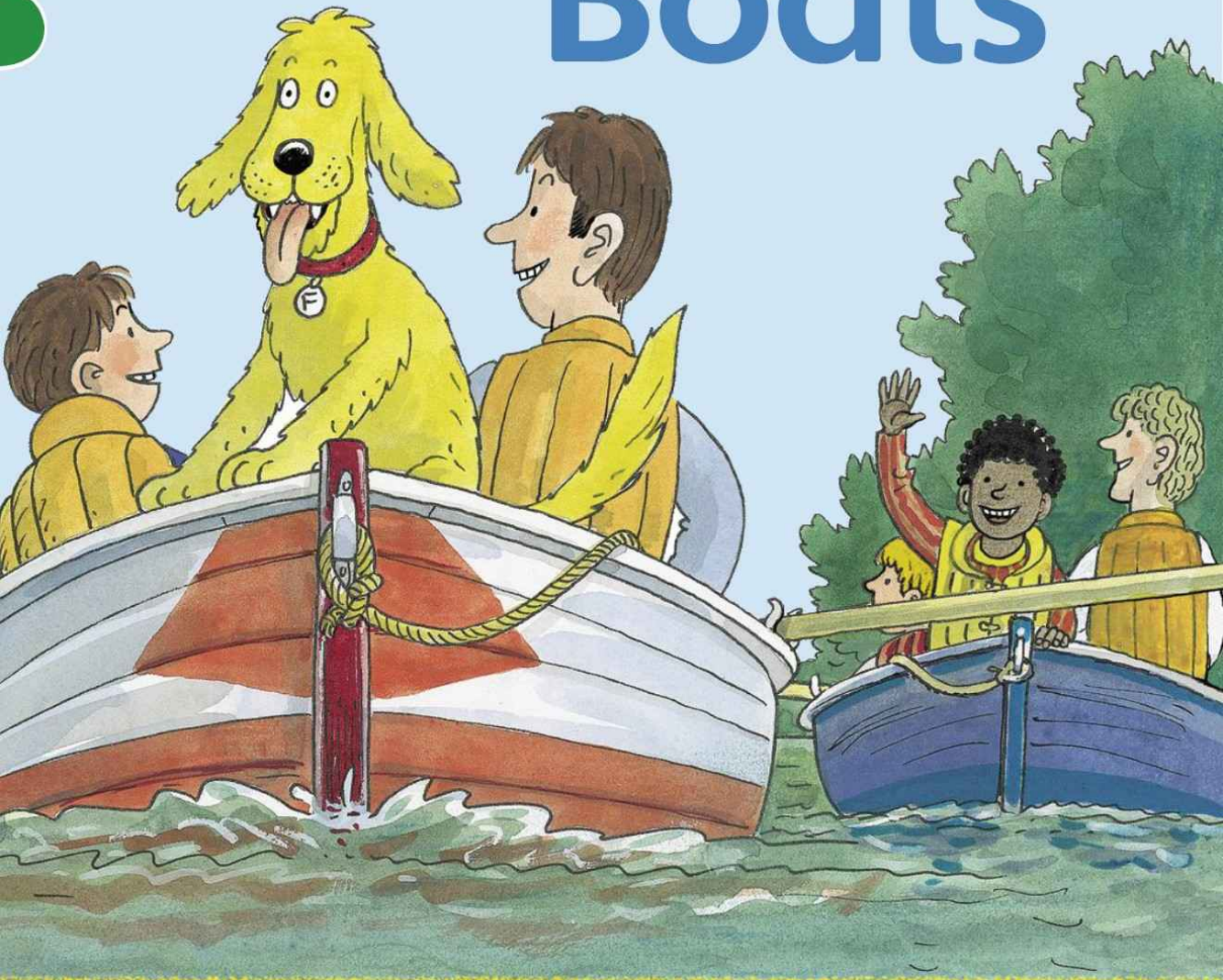


# Rowing Boats

## **BEFORE READING**

### **Talk together**

- Read the title and look at the picture. Ask: *What do you think will happen?*
- Look through the book and talk about the pictures.

### **Say the sounds**

These are the focus sounds and alternative spellings your child will practise in this book.

/oa/ as in **boat**, **Joe**, **rope**, **show**, **no**

/oi/ as in **voices**, **Joy**

These are the alternative pronunciations your child will practise in this book.

**y** as in **yes**, **y** as in **by**, **y** as in **very**

### **Sound the words**

These words practise the focus sounds and spellings for this book.

Encourage your child to say the sounds from left to right to read new words.

**floating soaking Joe rope stones show throw**  
**no noise voices boys enjoy yes by very**

### **Read these words together**

These words are common but children may find them harder to read.

**oh their called asked could**

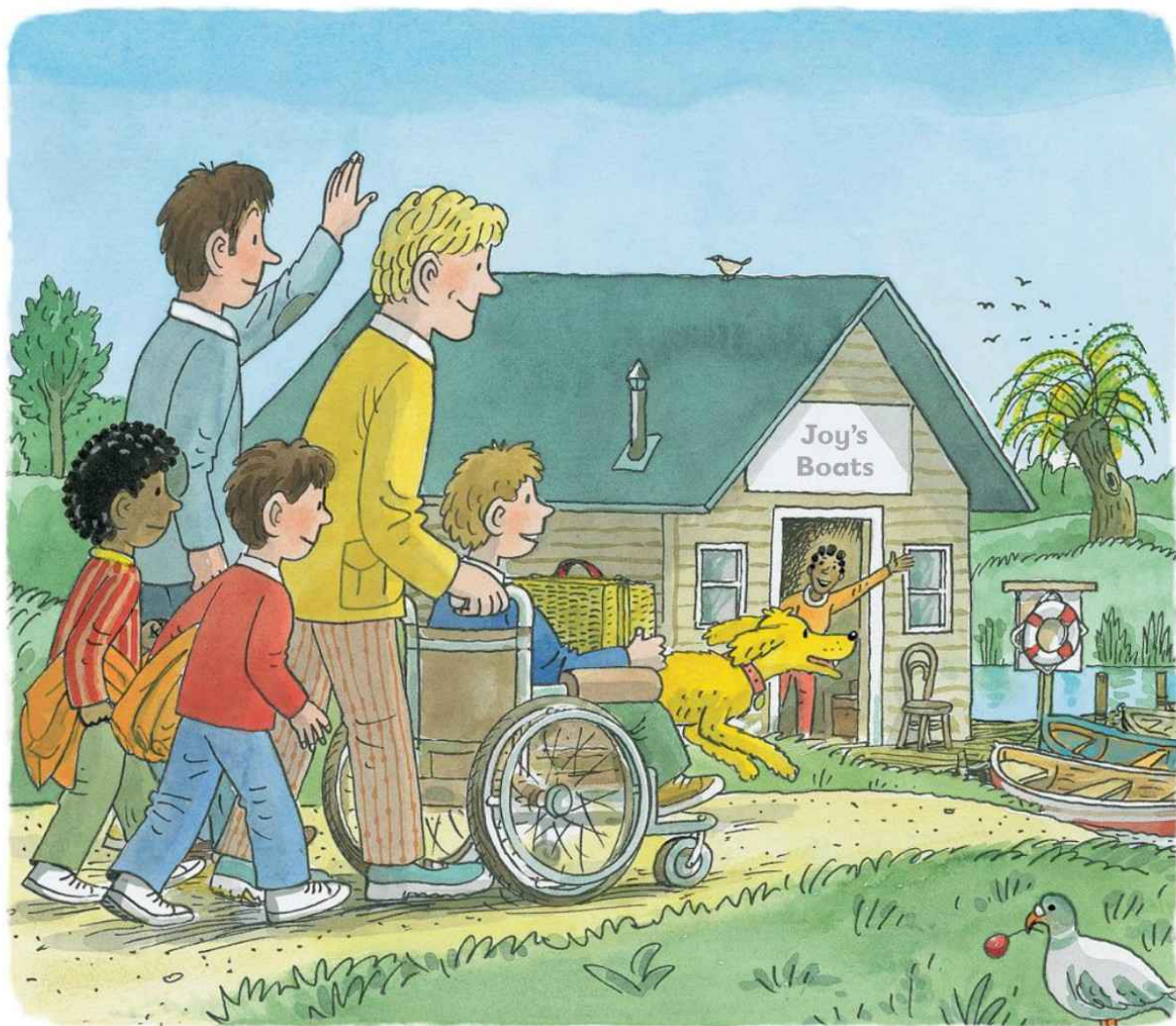


Enjoy reading and talking about the book together!

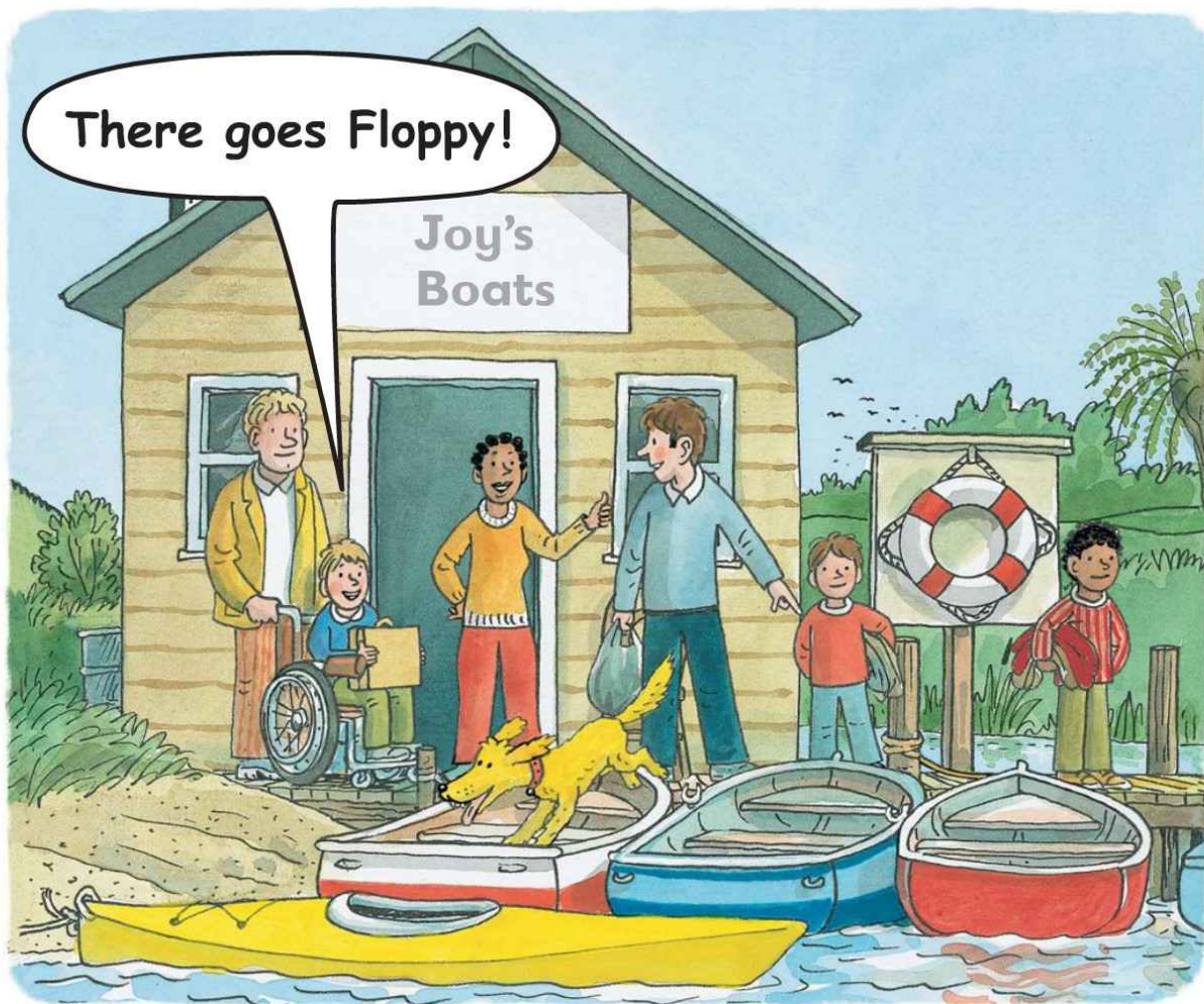


Wilf, Chip and Craig were going out on the river. Floppy went, too.

“Good choice,” said Joy.

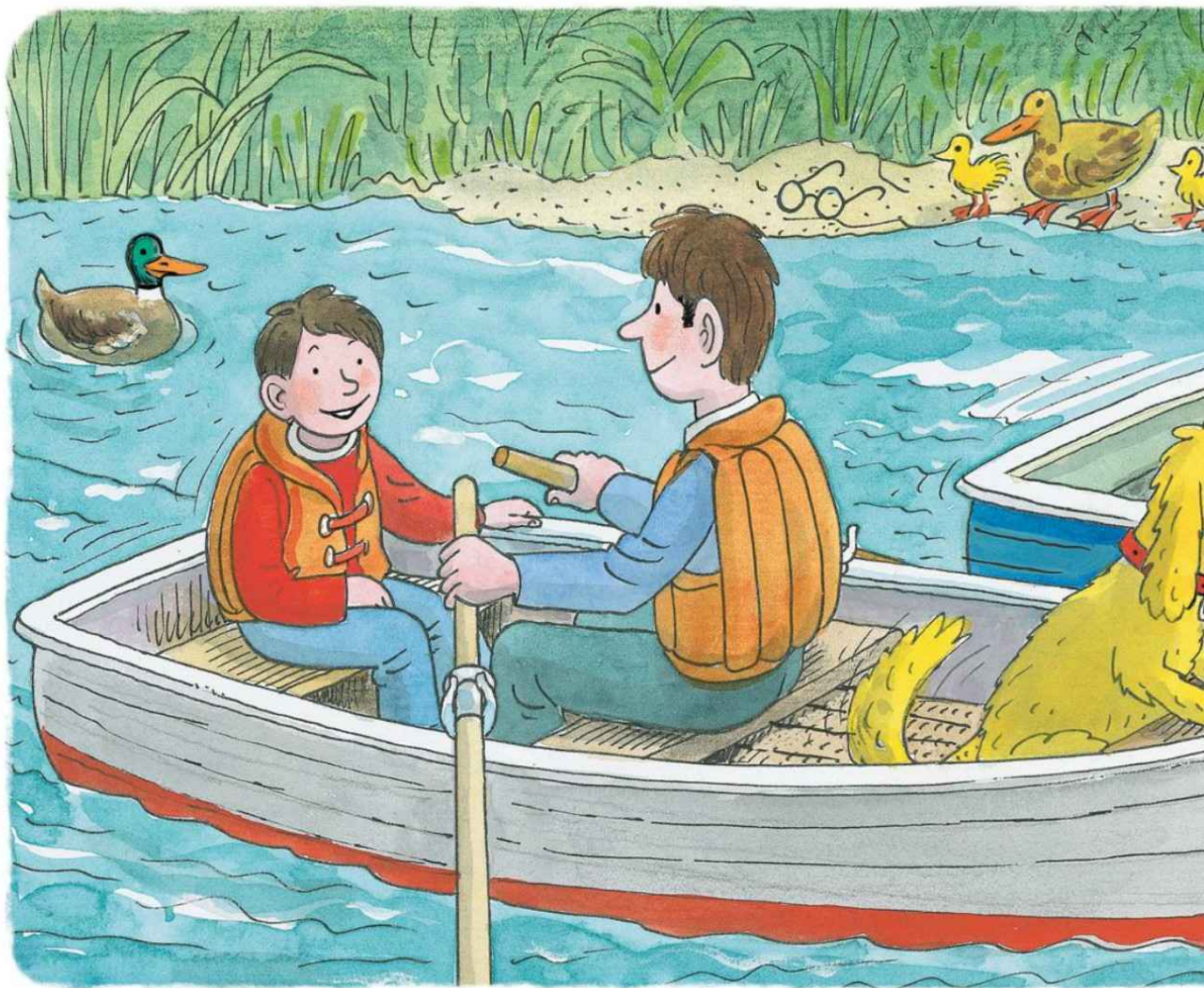




They put the picnic things into the boats, and got in.

“Yes, I’ll show you,” said Dad.



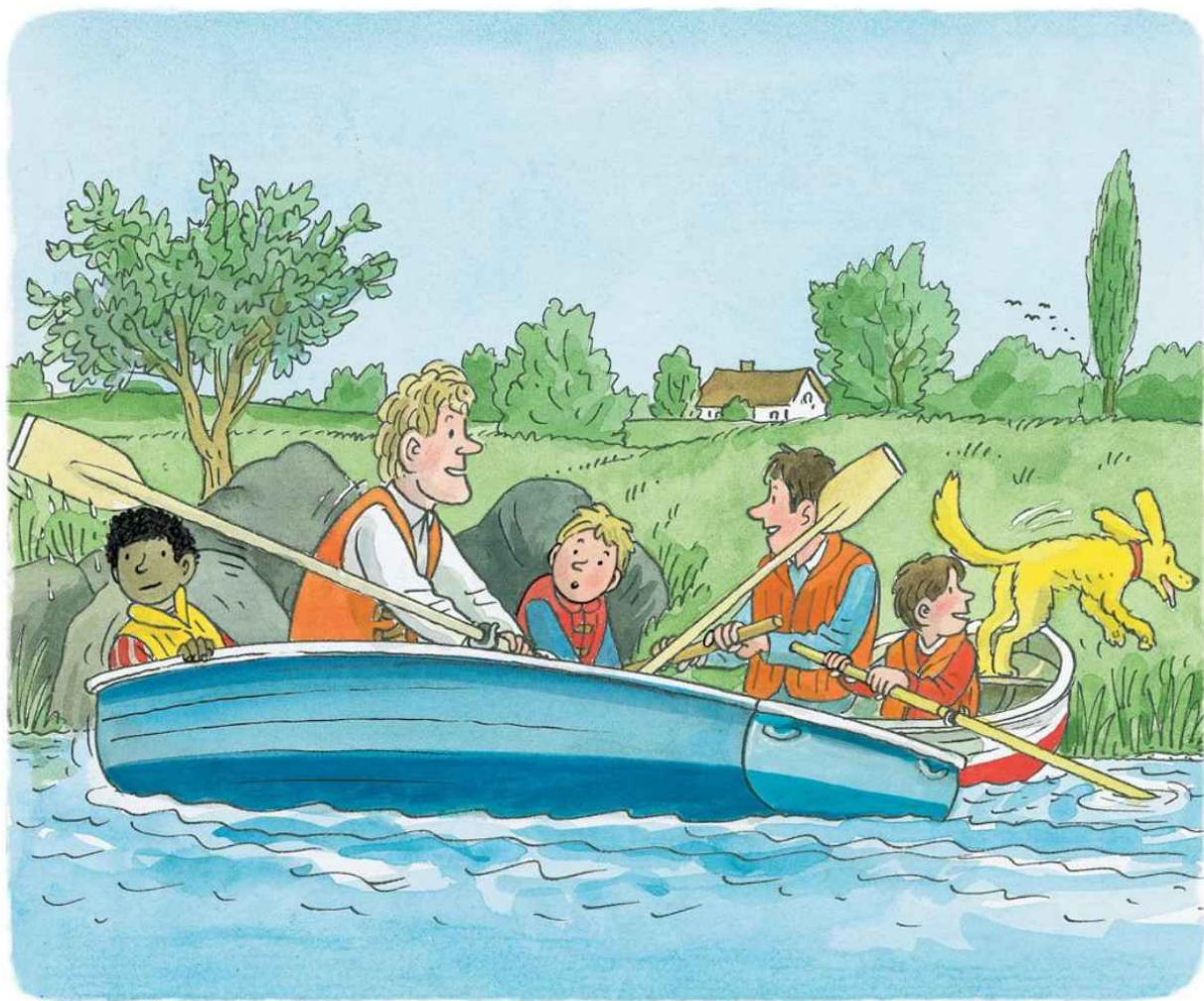


“You have a go, Craig,” said Dad.

“Hand me the coats,” said Craig.

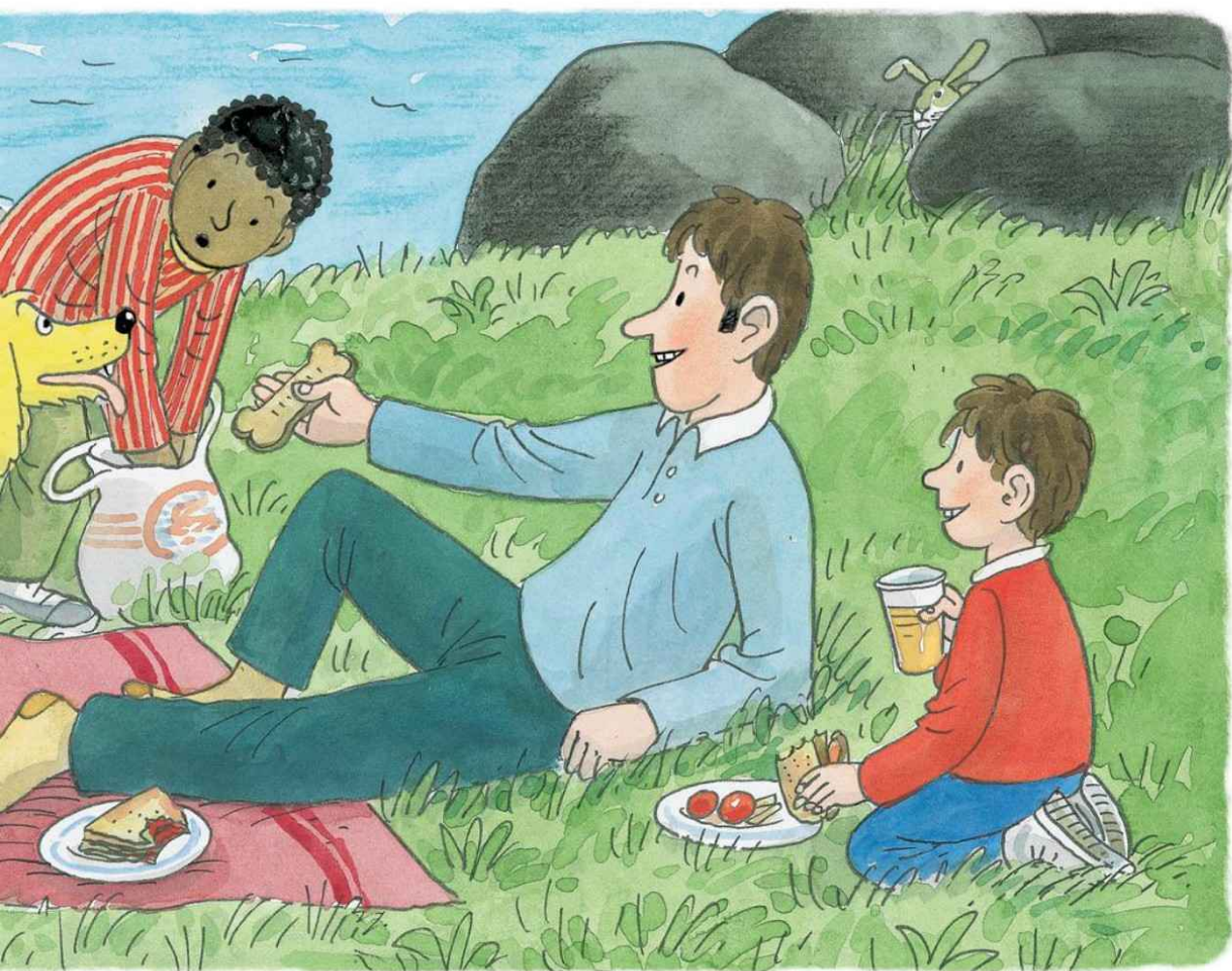




“These plums taste very good,” said Craig.

The boys were trying to throw a rope over a big stone.

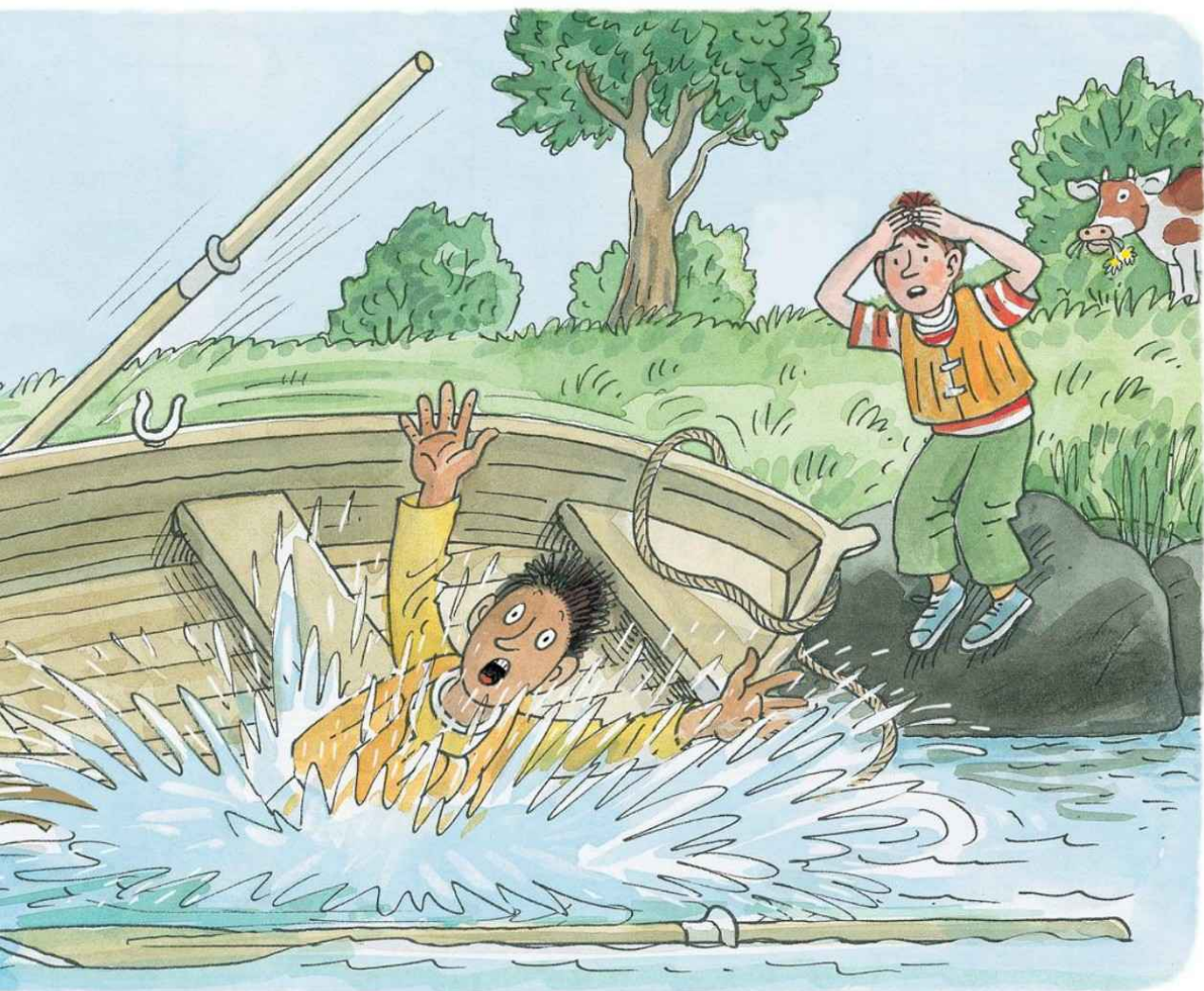




Just then, Joe fell into the river,  
and the rope fell in, too.

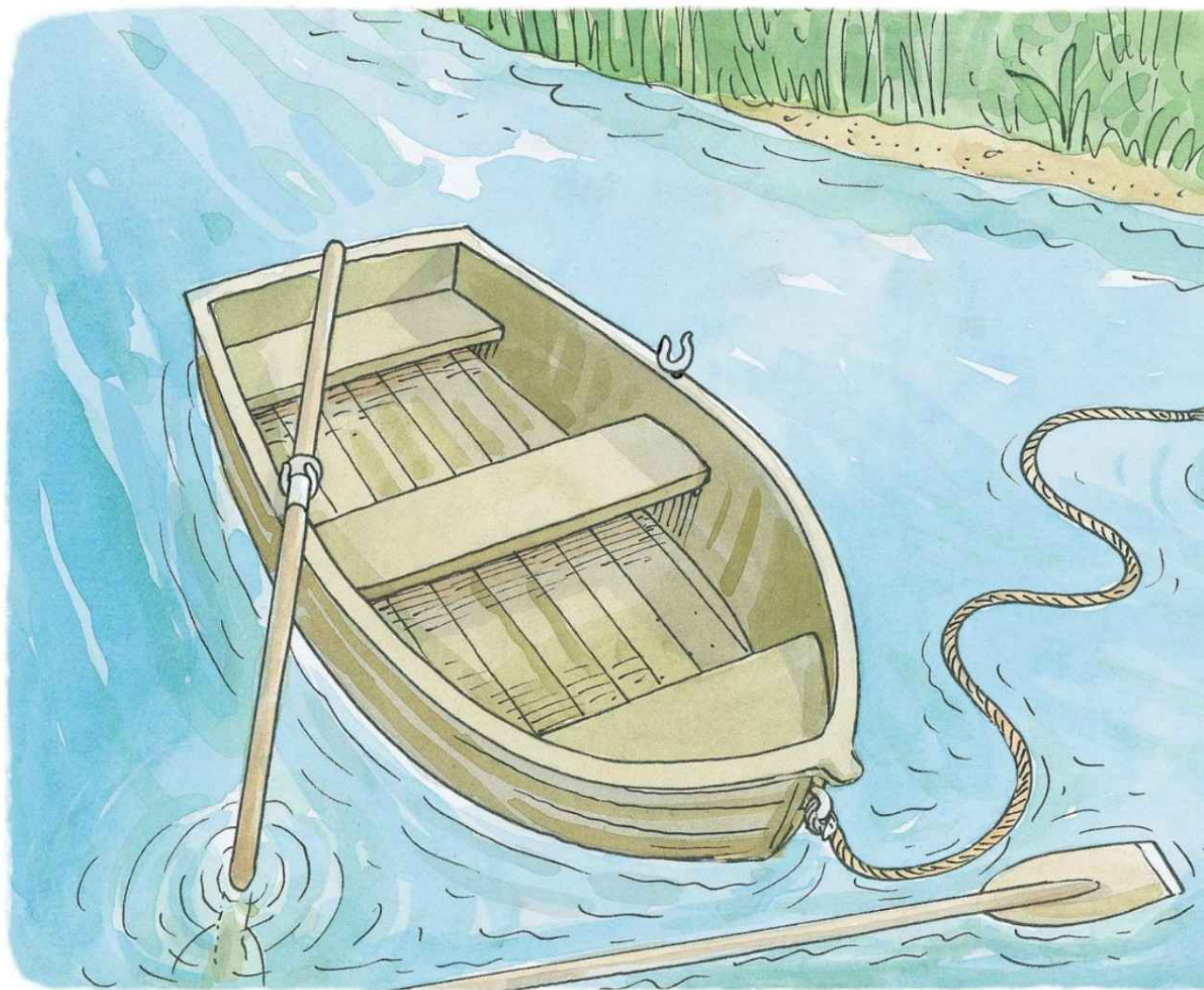


“Oh no!” said Roy. “Get hold of the rope.”

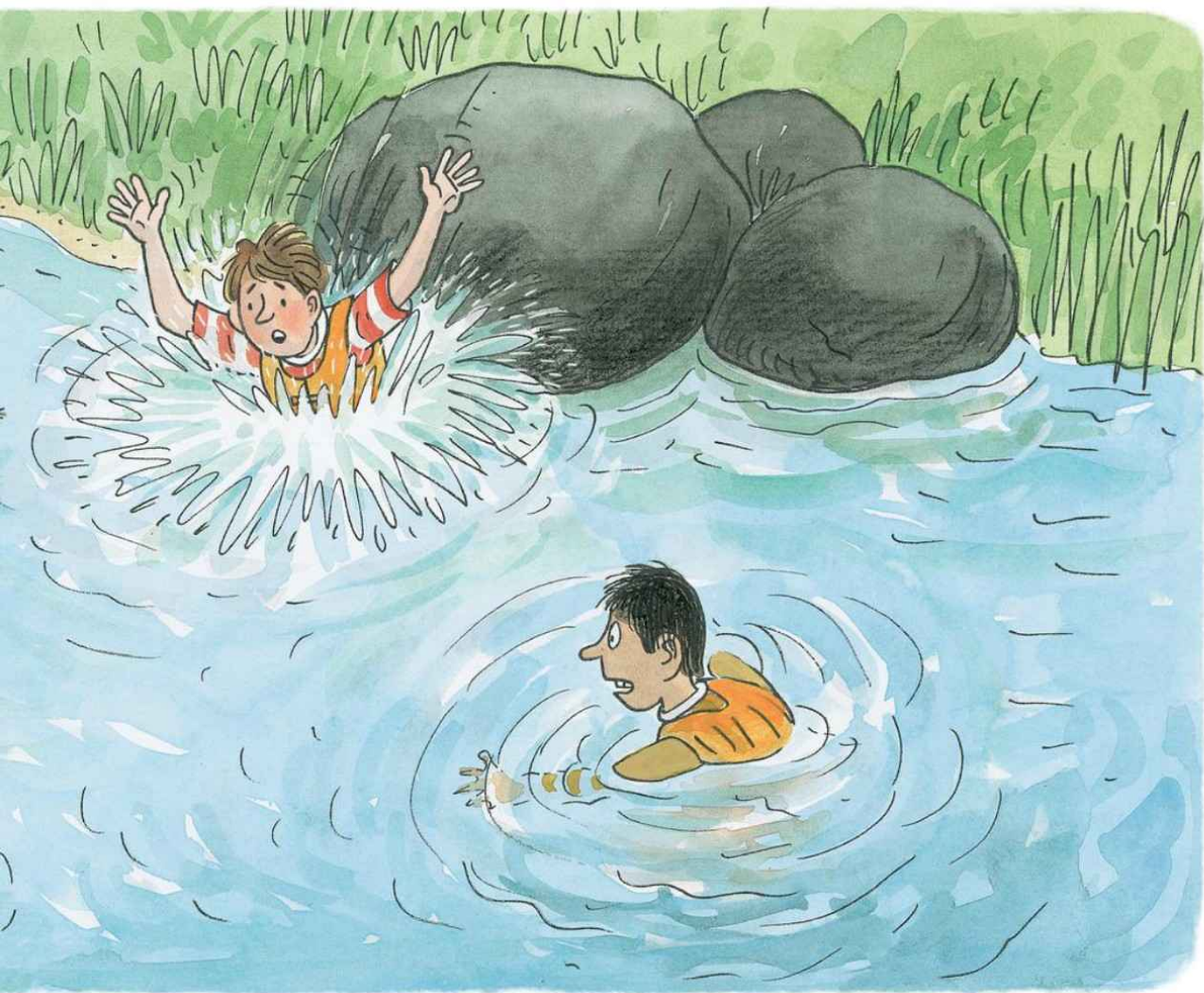




“Too late!” said Joe.

Suddenly, Floppy jumped into the river.

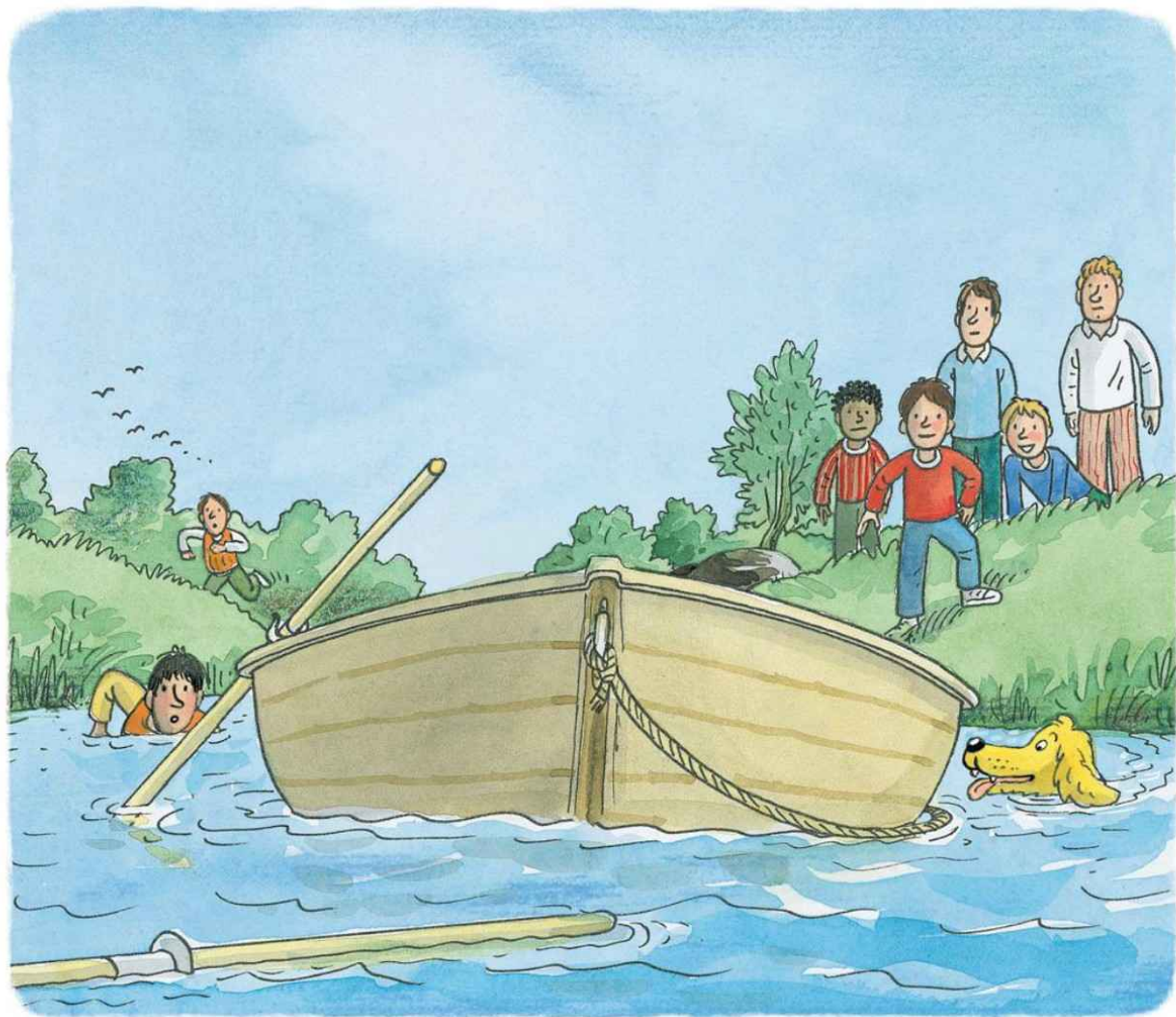


“He wants to join in and help,”  
said Chip.

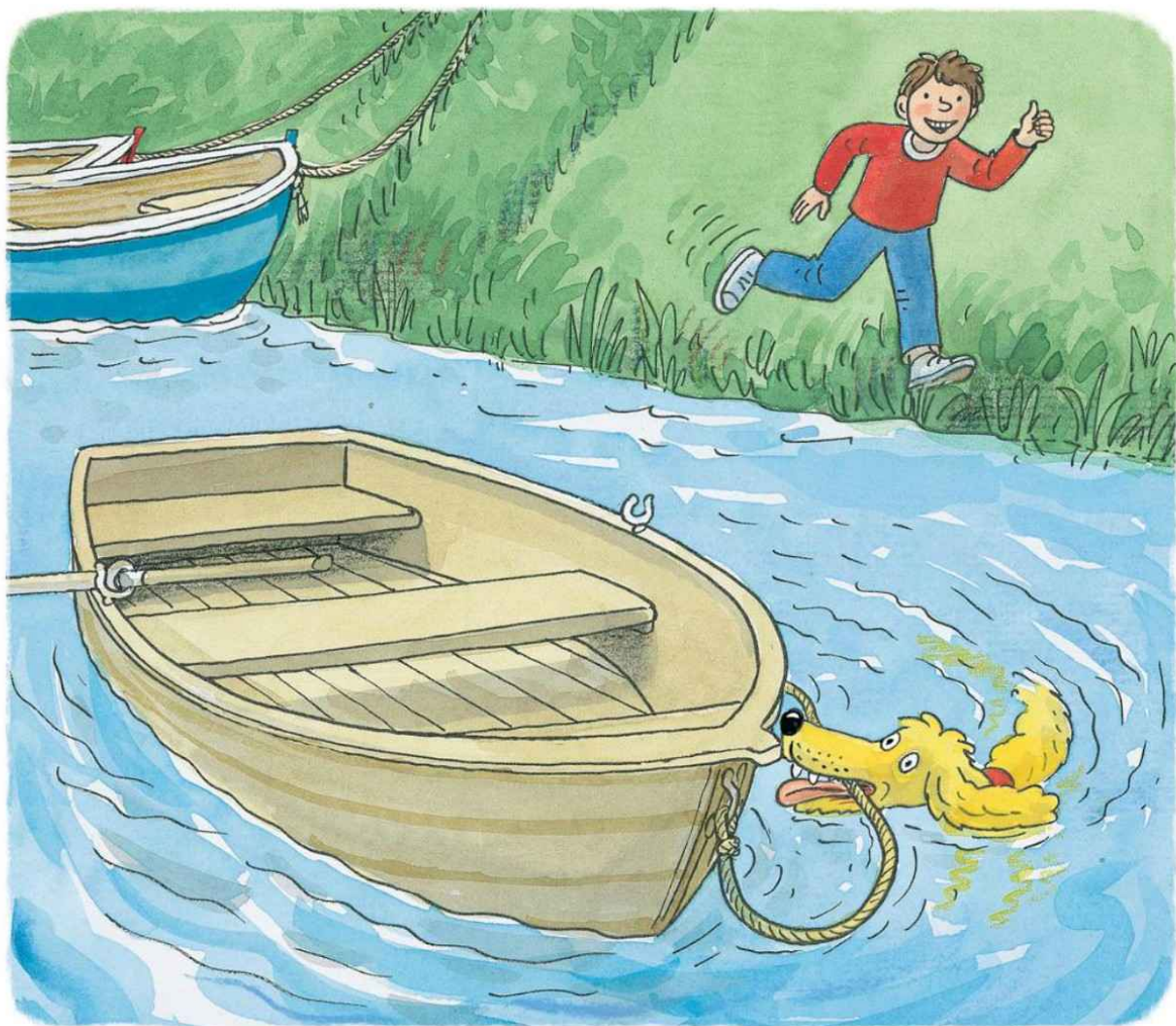




“Look,” said Craig. “Floppy is going for the rope.”

their boat.



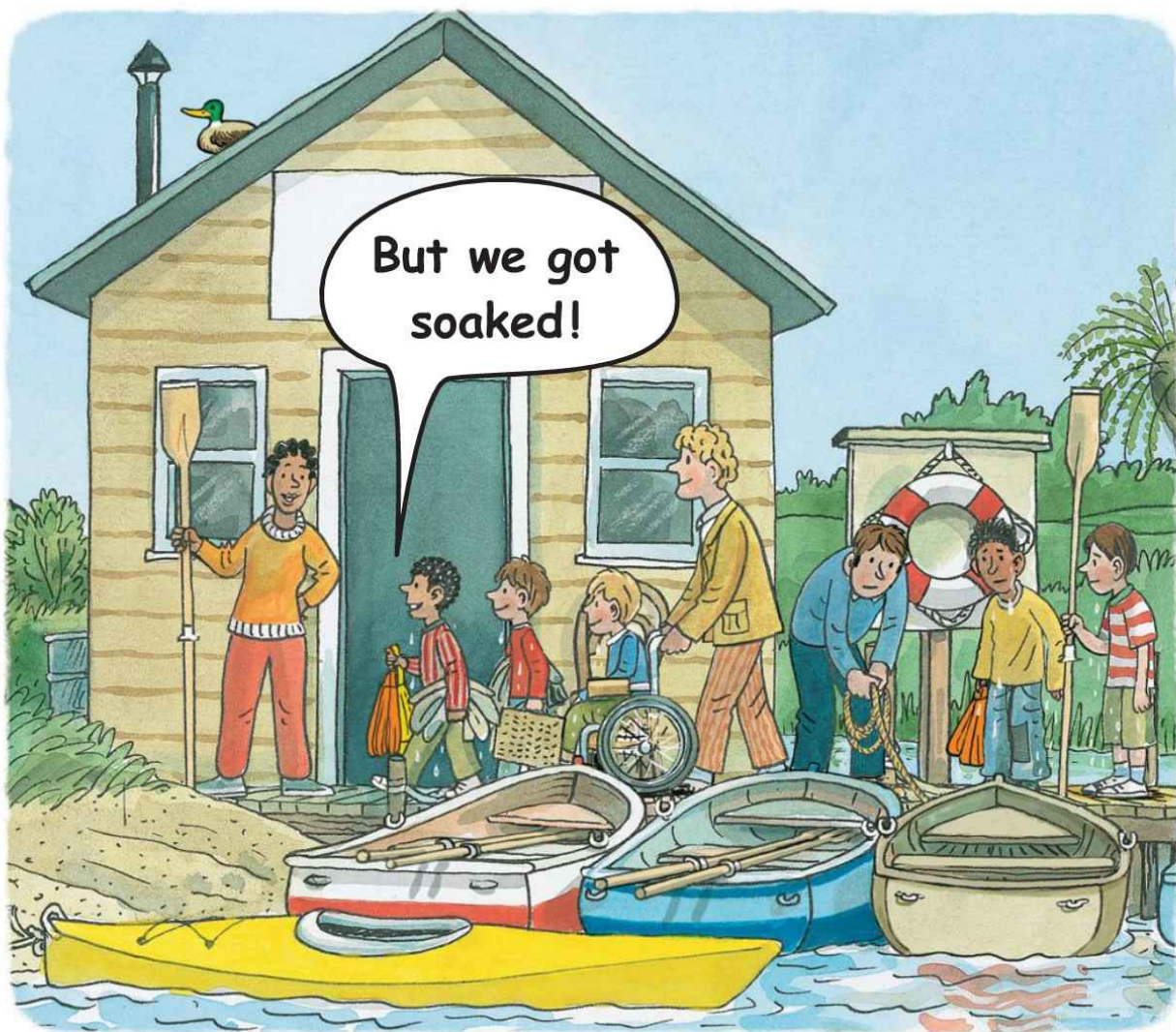


“Can you give us a tow?” asked Roy. “We can’t row back.”

## AFTER READING

### How many /oi/ words?

- Ask your child to find as many words with /oi/ sounds in them as they can. Encourage them to list the words to help with spelling. Ask them to add more words from their own memory afterwards.
- Ask: *How many different spellings does the sound have?*

## WHAT IS BLENDING?

For reading (decoding) say the sounds from left to right of the word and blend the sounds to hear the whole word.

### How to blend

Point under each grapheme (letter or letter group) as you say the sound, then run your finger under the whole word as you say the whole (or blended) word.

e.g. **s-oa-k-i-ng**     **soaking**

boats. Will they get soaked?

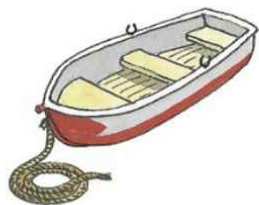
### Alternative spellings:
