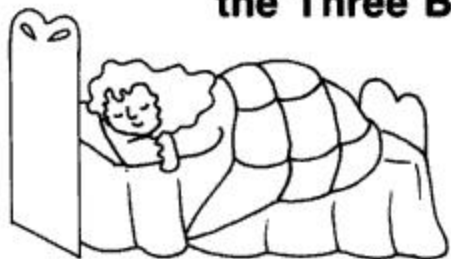

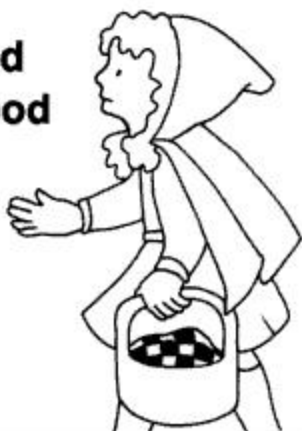

Once upon a time there was an old lady. One day she made a gingerbread boy for her husband. She put it into the oven to bake.

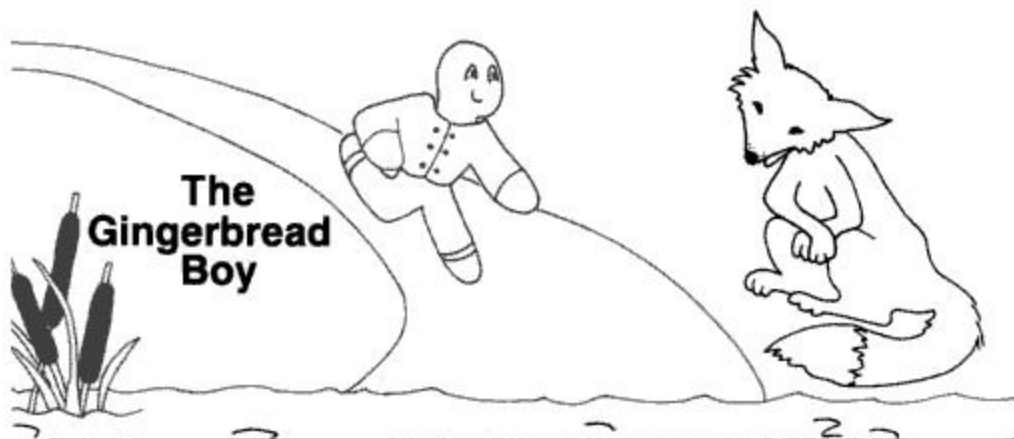
The gingerbread boy came to a river. He had to go across the water to get away.

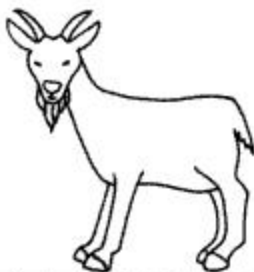

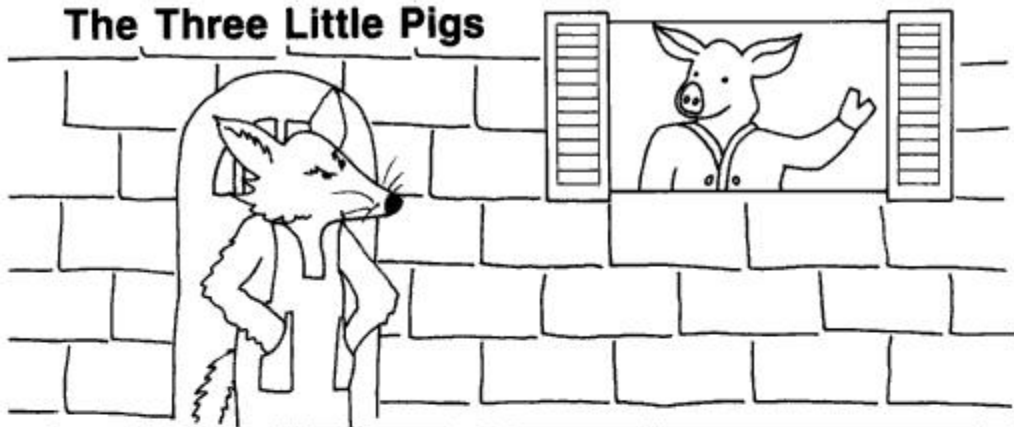

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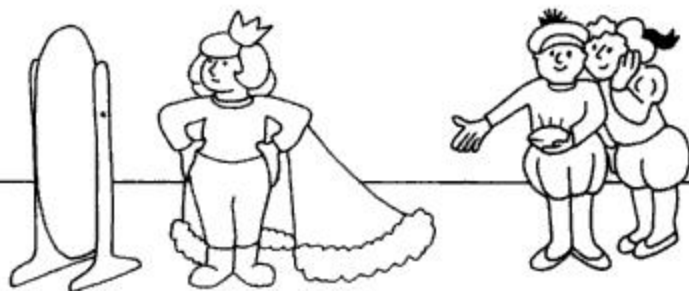
