

Tips for Reading Together


Children learn best when learning is fun.

- Talk about the title and the picture on the cover.
- Identify the letter pattern *ng* in the title and talk about the sound it makes when you read it.
- Look at the *ng* and *ck* words on page 4. Say each word and then say the sounds in each word (e.g. *sing*, *s-i-ng*; *shock*, *sh-o-ck*).
- Read the story and find the words with *ng* and *ck*.
- Do the fun activities at the end of the book.

Children enjoy re-reading stories and this helps to build their confidence.




"It is a Sing Song," said Dad.




"Let's go to the Sing Song," said Dad.

They met Wilf and Wilma.




Wilf and Wilma sang a song. They had fun singing it.






Kipper had a song to sing.

Biff and Chip sang a song.




It was a sad song.




Dad sang a song.



It went on and on.




Dad sang and sang. Let it rock, rock, rock.
